FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT GEORGE FORCIER

In our last Newsletter, I focused on how Sarasota Memorial Hospital (SMH) Specialty Clinic provides access to diagnostic testing and medical specialists for our patients, thus providing GSPHS the tools to offer comprehensive medical care. In this Newsletter, I will focus on how GSPHS provides prescription medication to uninsured financially needy patients who are treated by the SMH Internal Medicine Clinic located in the Newtown section in North Sarasota. This SMH clinic opened on July 5, 2017 in collaboration with the Florida State Medical School (FSUMS) to offer primary physician care to financially needy patients in an underserved section of Sarasota referred to as Newtown. This clinic also serves as a site for Florida State University School of Medicine physician residents to do a rotation in a primary care clinic as part of their training. With the exception of access to free prescription medication, the SMH Internal Medicine Clinic provides comprehensive health care to both insured patients who pay for health care, as well as uninsured patients with income below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). These latter patients also qualify for our free prescription medication services.

GSPHS has partnered with the SMH Internal Medicine Clinic to provide free prescription medication to financially needy uninsured patients who also qualify for our services. We accept many of the SMH documents that patients have already completed as part of the application process for free medical care at the SMH Internal Medicine Clinic, along with a few additional GSPHS required documents. This helps facilitate the application process for the patients and minimizes the duplication of forms that patients need to complete. GSPHS prescriptions are filled weekly by our dispensing pharmacy and delivered by GSPHS Patient Advocates to Newtown for pick up by their clinic patients. Without access to medication, physician care for these patients is significantly less effective. In return, several physicians who treat patients in Newtown also volunteer at the GSPHS medical clinic in Nokomis. We are grateful for this most valuable partnership that is beneficial to both GSPHS and the SMH Internal Medicine Clinic.
